It was the innerwheel club of Lagos to which of belong by courtesy of my husband - Rotarian Arch Dr. Daniel Edo Awani, please note that one does not require the sponsorship of a Rotarian husband/father/relative to join the innerwheel family these days, whereas Rotary membership is predicated on specifications, innerwheel membership is not.

If I may spool back to the years before we were chartered about the youngest new member, I

found myself rubbing minds with ladies of lofty personality. A good number of them wallowed unobtrusively in Knighthood MBE (MEMBERS OF British Empire) by Her Royal Highness, Elizabeth II Queen of England.

These were Lady Bank Anthony, Lady Kofo Ademola (Nee Eric Moore) the first woman in West Africa to obtain a BA degree from Oxford University; Lady Sodeinde, Lady Beatrice Spencer Ajo se and others of fragrant Memory. Mention must be made of Pioneers- Greenman, Moubayed, Sutherland, Audifferen, Bucknor Mc Lean, Olumuyiwa, Braithwaite and several others role models in their professions and various fields of endeavor.

Innerwheel member Alakija (Nee Smith) became the First President of Innerwheel Clubs in Nigeria, latterly by coincidence Nigeria fielded a member of the innerwheel club of Lagos IWM Yemisi Alatise who was voted Vice President (in the World body) 2015-2016, in Manchester



U.K IWM Alatisè was decorated International Innerwheel President 2016-2017. She's first in the African continent first black –as was Rotarian John Majiyagbe of the Rotary International President 2003 – 2004.

Innerwheel member Olabisi Solaru- the charter president of the Innerwheel club of Ilupeju was Nigeria's first member on the Board of International innerwheel board; while Ade Majiyagbe was the first Nigeria District Chairman, Dist 911 before the split into 4 districts, 911,912,913, 914. The journey and position details are recorded in the book (page 17).

Rotary/Innerwheel in those days was elitist and suffused with oratorical good humour. IWM Adelaja's Octogenarian Rotarian half (a cleric) was in my opinion the ultimate in priestly refinement. His roles resonate decades after, one could not ignore the de ja vous atmosphere of Rotary/Innerwheel events which in itself was powerful attraction; as was the determination to be counted among those who were willing to GIVE and not count the cost.

Innerwheel in Nigeria owes its survival and development to the critical intervention of mature minds; the intuitive and precocious handling of the affairs of clubs.

The constitution, tradition and thinking of innerwheel were and are given the needed filling by means of district rallies workshops, seminars and retreats which made room for collegiality, and inspired strategic thinking and survival mechanisms in tackling traditions and systems skewed against the underprivileged; and in some areas women.

Intune with global initiatives aimed at making life worth living in a world full of contradictions and cynicisms with our THEME in focus the beat goes on. Today images of innerwheel are aesthetically festooned across the landscape of Nigeria cities. Our lateness-for poverty alleviation scholarships, hospitals, homes built for the voiceless, quadruplets born to poor parents; and numerous projects of profound impact-some of which are captured in pictures in the book, define innerwheel.

I congratulate the past international president my fellow past and present Board members National Representatives, Presidents.

Governing body of innerwheel clubs in Nigeria, District Chairman (not genetic sense please) club presidents most of all the energetic proactive ladies who employing the use of their portable skills and global vision in collaborative work, undaunted by the challenges inherent in selfless services; are making the BADGE of innerwheel worthwhile and enjoying doing so. Commemorating 50 years of our journey with the permanence of a book is laudable INNERWHEEL AT FIFTY is a treasure trove/Library material. It is written in readable style and pleasurable.

The National Council of innerwheel clubs Districts in Nigeria was formed in 1991 and BM Stella Marie Awani was its first president.

INTERNATIONAL INNER WHEEL HISTORY

a brief historical look at the birth and evolution of inner wheel



THE FIRST TEN YEARS FROM A CLUB TO THE ASSOCIATION



Mrs. Margaret Golding, a nurse, business woman and the wife of a Manchester Rotarian started the Inner Wheel movement in 1924. Prior to 1924, wives of Rotarians in many cities and towns, prompted by a concern for public welfare, had been voluntarily, in the background, giving their time and energies to help in any service undertaken by their menfolk. On the 15th November 1923, twenty seven Rotary wives, led by Mrs. Golding, met in a Cooling Room (because it was free of charge) at Herriot's Turkish Baths, South Parade St. Mary's Street, Deansgate, owned by the Electro – Medical Treatment Company Limited, where they discussed the possibility of forming an independent ladies' group run on Rotary lines. The objects of the Club, they explained, would be twofold, to foster friendship and to offer much

more in the way of service. The next meeting, held at the Social Club in Lower Mosley Street, Manchester, which became their regular meeting place, was on 10th January 1924, and it marked the actual commencement of Inner Wheel with the formation of Manchester Club. Since 1970, January 10th has become universally recognized as WORLD INNER WHEEL DAY, when we celebrate the anniversary of that first meeting. Margarett Golding, the founder, was elected as the first President and Mrs. W. A. Nixon, the first Secretary, thirty members were present, and six basic rules were agreed. The first rule was the name of the Club shall be "The Inner Wheel" Thus ingeniously, they respected the wishes of Rotary, and the use of the word 'Rotary' was avoided, while the link with the men's organization was symbolized by reference badge-the Rotary Wheel. This link is still nurtured today and we proudly share the same ethical values and objectives. This was the beginning of a beautiful adventure, which is the heritage of the Inner Wheel organization, known and shared by every member. Looking back over the past 90 years, there are important dates and developments to remember, which show the evolution of our Association and its diffusion, first in Great Britain, then worldwide.

The basic rules laid down that day, with slight variations, continued to be used until the formation of the Association of Inner Wheel Clubs in Great Britain and Ireland in 1934. News of the formation of the Manchester Inner Wheel Club, and its achievements, began to spread. Rotary wives, who had been meeting together, contacted Mrs. Golding and gradually the movement spread throughout G.B & I and by 1927 another five new Clubs started their



journey: Liverpool, Macclesfield, Nelson, St Helens, and Warrington. In 1928, thanks to the collaboration of the Rotarians of Districts No 5, the 1st Inner Wheel District was formed, "No 5 Inner Wheel District Committee" The administration of the Districts, which followed, was the same as Rotary District procedure (officers were elected by ballot, two Delegates from each Club had representation, three if the Club had sufficient membership, and decisions were agreed by vote)

As more Districts were formed, they took the area number corresponding to their Rotary District. In 1931, there were 56 Clubs and by the end of 1932, 4 new Districts had been formed, 3 more in 1933 and the need for a central organization was being suggested. On 6th May, 1934, at the RIB. I conference held in Douglas, Isle of Man, the delegates of the 79 Clubs from existing 8 Districts, aware that it was necessary to have a Governing Body capable of guiding the growing number of Clubs and Districts, approved and ratified the Constitution, and adopted the name **"THE ASSOCIATION OF INNERWHEEL CLUBS IN GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND"**.

The first elected President of the Association was Mrs. Golding and the first Secretary, Mrs. Nixon. During the first meeting of the Council in September of 1934, the Treasurer, Mrs. Gladys Young.

(Canterbury) and Vice President Mrs. Shakerley (Clapham) were elected. The Association grew, and after 10 years had passed, there were 79 clubs (76 in England, 1 in Scotland, 1 in Wales and 1 in Ireland). These Clubs, which founded the Association, are still known today as "The 79 years".

TOWARDS GLOBAL DIFFUSION:

Even before 1934, some Clubs were formed in

other parts of the world, having heard about the Inner Wheel Organization in Great Britain & Ireland —such as Ballarat (1931), North Sydney (1933) and Bendigo (1933) in Australia. In the following years, more Inner Wheel Clubs were formed. For example, the Napier Club (1936) in New Zealand, Port Elizabeth (1938) in South Africa, and Winnipeg (1943) in Canada. From 1945, Inner Wheel continued to expand globally, with the formation of at least 15 clubs in remote places. Equally Inner Wheel's penetration into Europe extremely interesting. The first European club outside of Great Britain and Ireland was formed at Bergen (Norway) in 1935, thanks once again to Margarete Golding; the second after 10 years, retained as was, at Apeeldom, Holland. The Association began to change from a National Organization to a Worldwide Organization and it was felt that a closer connection was necessary. Thus in 1947, the words "In Great Britain and Ireland" were removed from the title and Inner Wheel became known as "ASSOCIATION OF INNER WHEEL CLUBS". In 1948, the six clubs in Holland formed the first District outside of Great Britain and Ireland, District no 26. In 1950 Club rules were translated into European Languages, and by July of that year, every member received a copy of Association magazine with the news of "Oversees" Clubs.

In the early sixties, the Association, mindful of the increasing number of clubs outside GB&I, and glad to have Districts formed in Europe, gave much thought about ways to make Inner Wheel more international in government and the need for personal contact to be made with some more remote Clubs. The first steps towards the creation of an International Governing Body were taken in 1962 during the Association Conference, held in Blackpool, England when a resolution was approved, to include on the Governing body, On the 1st of July 1967 all Clubs became Members of



INTERNATIONAL INNER WHEEL and Mrs. Lavender Weightman became President. There was then the opportunity for qualified members, from any country, to become President, Vice President and Treasurer. The first Board meeting was held in Copenhagen on the 3rd- 4th October 1967. One of the important tasks was to approve National By-Laws, so that all the countries, while remaining faithful to the Constitution, could interpret Inner Wheel with their culture and traditions. In 1967, NATIONAL COUNCILS were recognized in Australia, Denmark, Great Britain and Ireland, India, The Netherlands, Norway, The Philippines and Sweden.

In 1970, the first convention of the INTERNATIONAL INNER WHEEL was held at The Hague. The International Inner Wheel was, and is, supported by a Governing Body, which, up to 1993, included an elected Executive Committee with Officers-President, Vice President, Immediate Past President and Treasurer, and also Board Members — then representatives from every country, processing the necessary qualification as laid down in the Constitution and Handbook. Each Board Member had a number of votes equivalent to the number of Districts of her Country. In 1993, it was agreed to restructure the Governing Body with an elected Executive Committee (Consisting of the Officers), plus 16 elected Board Directors; each of whom have the right to one vote, and also have the responsibility to be in contact with the Non-Districted Clubs. Finally, in 2006 the Chairman of the Constitution Committee was admitted as a Member of the Governing Body of International Inner Wheel. Today, International Inner Wheel is present in 103 Countries/Geographical areas, counting over 103,000 Members, and is structured in Clubs, Districts and National Governing Bodies. It connects together members of Clubs in the

various nations, from Europe to Africa, India, Asia, Australia, New Zealand, United States of America and Canada and many others, all working to uphold the objects of Inner Wheel.

My Experience as President of International Inner Wheel

My rise to topmost hierarchy in Inner Wheel is an experience I will cherish my whole life. I joined Inner Wheel not thinking of getting to the top. I enjoyed giving personal service without counting the cost nor expecting reward.

I returned to Nigeria on the 2nd of July 2016 after my Installation in Manchester, England, to surprising rousing welcome party by members of District 911. I took office on the 1st of July 2016 and handed over on the 29th of June 2017. It has been a year of very extensive travel partly paid for by International Inner Wheel and supported by various donation I received from friends and Governors of Anambra and Enugu States. I was able to do more than expected in Touching Hearts of members around the world. Apart from the opportunity to spread my campaign against various abuse to the Female gender from Cradle to Grave. There was also a publication of the Coffee Table Book, which I took with me on all my trips for free distribution. I visited Pakistan and was received by the President Mamnoon Hussain and had the privilege to lay a Wreath at the Cenotaph of the Country. I met with Four Mayors in Italy, Citta de Castello, Spoleto, Treviso and Trieste. In Mexico I was received by Two State Governors, Puebla and Morelos where I was given a State Flag Ceremony and received a Distinguished Guest Award. I visited India and toured the State of Bangalore, Calcutta, Mumbai, Puri and Annand. I was in West Africa, Bourkina Faso and met with the Prime Minister of the country, Cote D'ivoir and Cotonou. I visited Australia and was in Sydney and Cairns. I was also received in Finland, visited St. Petersburg in Moscow, and was in Denmark and had reception at the Beach of North Sea and Baltic, Skagen. I visited Nigeria Districts and was received by two State Governor of Anambra and



Enugu States, a reception in Abuja with the presence of Minister of Information. I also was privileged to receive a warm welcome from my home District, District 911, Nigeria at the installation of the Chairman and her Executives for the year 2016/2017. I was in Colombo, In Mauritius I also met with President of the country Her Exc. Ameena Gurib, in Uganda, I met the Speaker of Parliament and was also received by Nigerian High Commission, Kenya, Mombasa, Casablanca, Morocco, USA Atlanta, Great Britain and Ireland.

International Inner Wheel was not registered as a fund raising organisation. The reason why our capitation is as low of £3.50 per member. We do not have the luxury of large monetary resources, we do not give grants and our membership fee is just enough to cover our expenses. However, countries are permitted to raise fund and spend for their projects as deemed fit. Clubs projects have been sponsored by contributions from



levies on members, donations by friends and corporate organisation and support from Rotary Clubs. It is most incredible the type of projects embarked upon by Inner Wheel Clubs in various countries.

We support as little as providing sanitary towels to girls who are not allowed in School because of their natural call of nature, upgrading school environment to Happy Schools, providing drinkable water to students with filters, constructions of school toilets, equipping school libraries, construction and equipping paediatrics wards in hospital, donation and maintainance of Dialysis Machine and Wards, building schools for free education from crèche to secondary, with free school uniform and a meal a day, supporting the government in bringing health awareness programme to the generality of the public, providing sneever dogs for customs, to assist in drug control and money laundering, free eye screening and medication for school children, scholarship for Under graduates, women empowerment and skill acquisition for single girls, micro credits for women, taking care of abandoned pregnant girls, who are sexually abused by relatives, taking care of Vesico Virginals Fistula girls, construction of hospitals and paying for Medical surgeries and rehabilitation of the affected, taking care of the depressed, building homes for vulnerable, school in bag project to provide stationeries and personal toiletries to thousands of children, paying for a meal a day for many students, maintaining artefacts and monuments in city squares, beautification of gardens and squares. Buying school sandals, sports equipment's, teaching one on one school children who dropped out of school to discover their strength and build on it.

All these are done by Inner Wheel Clubs around the world with no funding for IIW. Because we

are women we seems to know the little things that go a long way in supporting the poor. The goal of service organisation like Rotary and Inner Wheel is a common one. To achieve this is not to kill Inner Wheel, but to encourage participation in any way possible. Rotary does very big things, because of the monetary power they have. They raise fund through Paul Harris Fellow and give grants to Districts for their operations. Inner Wheel activities is like little drops of water and little grains of sand that make a mighty ocean. We are doing the same thing in different ways. How fantastic would it have been if you share your grants with Inner Wheel Clubs to get to the poorest of the poor in the society? Because we know them, we work with them, and more can be achieved through us, because we have time. We are not in competition with Rotary, our services is of great complement to each other. It was difficult some years back with the introduction of Female members to Rotary Clubs. We are back in full swing and our membership is rising again. The purpose of introduction of female membership in Rotary is being defeated in some countries and you can find them coming back to Inner Wheel because they did not feel fulfilled in their attempt to serve the poor and give back to the society through personal service.

I have seen many Litigations amongst members, Clubs and Districts, which made me to appreciate the gentle understanding we have in one another within our Districts and the National Governing Body in Nigeria.

It dawned on me, that District 911 is the largest District in Africa. The first Club formed in Africa was Inner Wheel Club of Mombasa in 1963. It has remained the only surviving Club in Kenya till date. Inner Wheel came to Nigeria through IWC of Lagos in 1967, and it has grown to over 90 Clubs and 3 Districts. Inner Wheel Club of Port



Elizabeth in South Africa was formed in 1970 and they have only five Clubs to date. In Egypt, Inner Wheel Club of Cairo formed in 1971, they have only 5 Clubs with one District. Inner Wheel Club of Cotonou formed in 1978, they have not been able to form a National Governing Body within a District formed by 7 countries. Amongst the minority countries in Inner Wheel data base, Nigeria is on top. We have been struggling to get our membership to 1,000 for the past few years. There is strength in number, voting papers are printed out with the numbers of members of the contestants' country.

Margaret Golding Award voting is in camera by the executive. You are not permitted to discuss with other members except at the meeting where CVs are read and votes are cast. It takes more than giving scholarships to poor students, personal sacrifices of mental and physical involvement are key to the criteria. It cannot be influenced by any executive, except there is a tie and the President has a deciding vote.

Board Directors votes are counted by Auditors. All enveloped marked voting papers are directed unopened to the Auditors office, who counts and sends in result to the office. It cannot be influenced by any individual. No canvassing is permitted, voting is done by all Clubs in various

countries. We need to be more outwards looking and interact internationally. I thank all members who used to travel internationally with me for various programmes. Even though the travels were for us to enjoy inner wheel, promote the name of Nigeria positively. This should not be stopped.

I cherish the experience and achievements, which cannot be taken away from me for ever. I have made very good friends around the world, I have enjoyed sincere love and affection expressed by expensive gifts. I have seen the other side of love as well from both expected and unexpected. It has enriched me positively, I understand human natures more than before. I take this opportunity to pay tribute to my late Husband for taking me to Rotary Ladies night and 1977 and got me invited to Inner Wheel activities.

INNER WHEEL IN NIGERIA



Rotary came to Nigeria in 1961 with the formation of a club in Kano in April, and another in Lagos in May 1966. The first inner wheel club in Nigeria was formed in Lagos with Mrs Deji Alakija as its Charter president in 1967. The second club was Inner Wheel club of Ikeja, its Chapter certificate was presented by the International Inner Wheel President, Mrs. Marjorie Foster in 1969. The third club was formed in 1980 in Kano from 1982. Many clubs were formed in rapid succession and by June, 2017, there are 75 active clubs with 970 members in three Districts in Nigeria.

911 - Lagos and Ogun State

913 - Ondo, Osun, Oyo, Abuja FCT, Sokoto, Kwara, Niger and Ekiti States. Zamfara and Kebbi States

914 - Edo, Delta, Bayelsa, Anambra, Enugu, Imo, Abia, CrossRiver, Akwa Ibom and Ebonyi State.

The growth of Rotary extended to Inner Wheel and formation of District 911 emerged in 1984/85 with Mrs. Adeola Majiyagbe as its First District Chairman. The District split into District 911 and 912. District 912 had Mrs Beatrice Agama as its First District Chairman in 1985/86 with PMB Bisi Solaru in district 911. Both Districts had the honour of Mrs. Doris Browne, the then International president at their inauguration. As at 1st July 1988 there were four inner wheels districts (911, 912, 913 and 914). District 912 became inactive (in 1997/98 inner wheel year) which leaves Nigeria with 3 districts to date.

By July 1986, Inner Wheel in Nigeria became eligible constitutionally to send a representative of Inner Wheels Clubs in Nigeria to the board of International Inner Wheel. Mrs. Bisi Solaru, Past District Chairman of D911 was elected to serve on the board in the 1986/87 year. Mrs Ade Majiyagbe took over for 1987/88 and Mrs. Beatrice Agama in 1990/91.

The Inner Wheel Year 1991/92 saw the formation of National Council for Inner Wheel Clubs in Nigeria and the governing body of the Nigeria districts, with Mrs. Stella Awani in the dual capacity as the first President of National Council of Inner Wheel Clubs in Nigeria and Board member. Mrs. Femi Oyeleke took over from her in 1992/93, followed by Mrs. Tayo Olutoye in 1993/94 and Mrs Joan Ogbuehi for the 1994/95 Inner Wheel year respectively. The National Council of Inner Wheel was changed to National Governing Body of Inner Wheel Clubs 1995/96. In the same year, Mrs. Oluremi Omotosho became 1st National Representative/President of National Governing Body in Nigeria, followed by Mrs. Christy Okoye for 1996/97, Mrs Bukky Balogun for 1997/98, Mrs Edith Okokon for 1998/99 and Mrs. Adenuga Taiwo for 1999/2000 Inner wheel year respectively. For 2000/2001, Mrs Kemi Adegbite was the National Representative followed by Mrs Uzunma Amaonwu for 2001/2002, Mrs. Doyin Otuyalo for 2002/2003; Funmi Adeshina for 2003/2004, who also served as International Inner Wheel Board Director 2007/2008, Mrs Eunice Nwankwo was the National Representative and President of National Governing Body for 2004/2005 and she



also served as International Inner Wheel Board Director 2005/2006, Mrs Titi Ismail served as National Representative and President of National Governing Body for 2005/2006.

Mrs Ranti Adetuberu served in 2006/ 2007 and also served as 2011/2012 Board Director, Mrs. Sally Unam served in 2007/2008 also served in 2009/2010 as the International Inner Wheel Board Director, Mrs Oluyemisi Alatisse served as National Representative and President of National Governing Body for 2008/2009 and she served as International Inner Wheel Board Director 2010/2011 and she rose to the post of International Inner Wheel President 2016/2017(the first African to be elected into that position), Mrs Ayo Odelana served in 2009/2010 and served as IIW Board Director, 2014/2015, Mrs Ngozi Adirika served in the same capacity in 2010/2011 and also served as the IIW Board Director for the year 2012/2013. Mrs Adedoyin Abiodun-Oredein was President of the National Governing Body and National Representative for 2011/2012 and she served as IIW Board Director 2013/2014.

In 2012/2013 Mrs Grace Adekoya was the National Representative and President of the National Governing Body. Mrs Ify Ndefo served in 2013/2014 as the National Representative and President of the National Governing Body, she also served as IIW Board of Director in 2016/17.

In 2014/2015, Mrs Osenike Ajadi served as National Representative and President, National Governing Body for Inner Wheels Club in Nigeria followed by Mrs Phebean Alade who served in the same capacity in 2015/2016. Mrs Uche Agbim served in the same capacity in 2016/2017. Currently, Mrs Abimbola Sowande is

the National Representative and President National Governing Body for Inner Wheel Clubs of Nigeria.

"HOW IT ALL BEGAN"

Early days of the Inner Wheel Club of Lagos

(the first Inner Wheel Club in Nigeria)

In 1966, while the Rotarian (Dr.) Modele Alakija was President of the Rotary Club of Lagos, he encouraged his wife, Mrs. Deji Alakija to organise an Inner Wheel Club in Lagos. All Rotanans of the Lagos Rotary Club were also urged to encourage their wives to join the new Inner Wheel Club.

The Club was registered on the 1st July 1967, having accepted international Constitution and National Bye-Laws, for membership of International Inner Wheel, with Club number 1276. The charter was presented by the president of the Rotary Club in Nigeria,

The earliest meetings began in April 1966, in the home of the Alakijas in Keffi Street, Lagos. The Foundation Members were:

Mrs. Deji Alakija (who became Charter President), Mrs. O. Ajose, Mrs. T. O. Oshindero, Mrs. Bisi Braithwaite, Mrs. Eva Adelaja, Mrs. Svelick, Lady Lande Bank-Anthony (the first Treasurer), Mrs. Akerele, Mrs. Molly Dada, Mrs. Elsie Ibru, Mrs. Mollie Johnson, Mrs. G.O. Olumuyiwa, Mrs. Otun, Mrs. Tina Audifferen, Mrs. C.U. Isijola, Mrs. Joko Edu, Mrs. A. Greenman, Mrs. E. Mobayed, Mrs. Fadeke George -Charter Secretary, and Mrs. Grace Guobadia. Some of these members are now of blessed memory.

Those early monthly meetings afforded us the

opportunity to learn and discuss thoroughly the Constitution and By-Laws of the Inner Wheel; later the venue of the meetings was rotated among other members' homes. We applied for a Charter and in July, 1967, we were Chartered as Club No. 1267 on the Roll of International Inner Wheel. Our Charter was presented to us by the President of the Lagos Rotary Club, Mr. Jack Farnsworth at a colourful ceremony.

We then went to work in earnest, our first project being the "Keep Ikorodu Road Clean" Campaign. We were able to obtain 100 empty oil Drums from the Mobil Oil company through the good offices of Mr. Michael Otedola, then a Senior Public Relations Manager at Mobil Oil. (He later became Sir Michael Otedola, Governor of Lagos State).

The Drums were painted in Inner Wheel Colours and placed at strategic points along Ikorodu Road-, members then went along with brooms and swept the sides of the Ikorodu Road, demonstrating and teaching the women who had stalls along the road the proper use of these garbage bins. We also concluded arrangements with the Mushin Local Government Council for the regular clearing and collection of the garbage from the bins.

When, a few weeks later some of the drums were removed by unknown persons, Mr.



Otedola (as he then was) most generously arranged for replacements! Thus we were able to sustain for quite a significant while our environmental sanitation project which predated the now nation-wide Environmental Sanitation Day observed monthly all over the country.

Our first Fund-Raising Dinner dance was held at the Club Bagatelle in October 1968, with Mrs. Olufunmilayo Johnson, wife of the then Governor of Lagos State as our Guest of honour.

Several more projects have been undertaken by the Inner Wheel Club of Lagos since that first one, started way back in 1968. These include:

1. Donation of Toys and books to the Salvation Army Home;
2. Donation of Wheel-chairs to the Old Peoples' Home, Yaba;
3. Care of a total of five sets of Triplets from birth to school age-,
4. Award of a typewriter to the best student of the year at the United Secondary Commercial College, Apapa in memory of I.W.M. Fadeke George - made possible by a donation by her father, Mr. Nubi;
5. Support for a Blood Bank Government Project;
6. Donation of an Incubator to the Massey Street Children's Hospital;
7. Construction and establishment of a Transit Camp in Idi-Araba, Surulere, Lagos, for stray children-,

8. Sponsorship of two children for Hole-in-the-Heart Surgery in the U.S.A. under the Gift of Life Programme of Rotary.

The Inner Wheel Club of Lagos continues to go from strength to strength, and its fund raising activities continue to be famed for their fun-filled success and the worthiness of the causes.

FORMATION AND SPREAD OF INNER WHEEL IN NIGERIA



The first Inner Wheel Club in Nigeria was formed in Lagos in 1967 and Mrs. Deji Alakija as its chartered president. In 1969, the second Inner Wheel Club of Ikeja was formed with Dorothy Myers as Charter President

Both clubs interacted till when the third Club was formed by 1980 in Kano and from 1982, many Clubs were formed in rapid succession and presently there are over 76 chartered Clubs in Nigeria with about 1025 members.

The Chartered Clubs were districted into Districts 911 and 912 and the first District Chairman Mrs. Adeola Majiyagbe and Mrs. Onikepo Oshodi as its first District Secretary.

Inner Wheel grew and had two Districts 911 and 912 in 1985/86 with Mrs. Bisi Solaru and Mrs. Beatrice Agama as Chairmen respectively. In that year the two Districts had the honour of the visit of International Inner Wheel President Mrs. Doris Browne. She was present at the induction ceremony of District 911 and inauguration of District 912.

As at July 1st 1988, there were four Inner Wheel Districts, D911, 912, 913 and 914.

The four Districts are:-

D911 - Lagos and Ogun States

D912 - Benue, Gongola, Plateau, Bauchi, Bornu, Kano, Jigawa, Kaduna and Katstina States.

D913 - Oyo, Osun, Ondo, Kwara, FCT, Niger, Kogi and Sokoto States.

D914 - Imo, Rivers, Akwa Ibom, Edo, Delta, Cross River, Enugu and Abia States.

By July 1986, Inner Wheel District 911 became eligible constitutionally to send a representative for NIGERIA to the Board of International Inner Wheel. The first such representative Mrs. Bisi Solaru, Past District Chairman of D911 was elected to serve on the board in the 1987/88 year. Mrs. Adeola Majiyagbe took over for 1988/89 while Mrs. Fola Onalaja served in 1989/90. Mrs. Agama 1990/91 and Mrs. Stella Marie Awani who served a dual role of Board Member and first Chairman of the Nigeria National Council 1991/92.

In 1992/93 Mrs. Femi Oyeleke served as the Board Member and President of National Council.

Inner Wheel Clubs in Nigeria have contributed in no small measure to the social Development of their communities. They have been involved in many charitable projects notably the building of Health Centre, Maternity Centre, Mammogram Centre, School Halls, Libraries, Transit camp for Lost children and Vocational centre in Amuwo-Odofin with "Wall of Kindness" and various training and Empowerment programmes. Significant contribution to the Polio Plus Programmes. We equipped play centres, gave clothing and food stuff to destitute, aged and orphans, awarded scholarship, donated Hospital equipments, including dialysis machine to State Government-owned hospitals



The Margarett Golding Award

It was decided at the 11th IIW Convention in May 2000, in Stockholm (Sweden) that an award – similar to the Rotary Paul Harris fellowship – be created in the name of **Margarett Golding**, the founder of Inner Wheel, for highly commendable personal service to the community, either personally or through Inner Wheel.

The award has been available since September 2001 and over 200 people have now received a Margarett Golding Award (MGA). The award may be given to Inner Wheel members, or to members of the general public, for outstanding personal service, which must be completely unconnected with work on behalf of Inner Wheel or for Inner Wheel/Rotary fundraising (pg. 61 Constitution/Handbook refers).

The successful Margarett Golding Award recipients have generally been involved with a variety of charities or organisations for a very long time, often involving a great deal of commitment on a very regular basis. This work must be completely unconnected with Inner Wheel membership, Inner Wheel or Rotary fundraising activities. Alternatively or in addition, they must have made great personal sacrifices for the benefit of others.

The award is not for bravery or endurance of hardship in their personal life.

The award is not in recognition for work for which the recipient has received payment.

The award is not given for members who have filled a

number of positions in Inner Wheel over many years. Members who have given long and valuable service to Inner Wheel but who do not qualify for a Margarett Golding Award, may be recognised with the award of Honoured Active Membership.

The criteria for success are set high so that the award remains a truly significant marker of an individual's commitment to others.

Application Guidelines

Applications for the Margarett Golding Award must be made on the original application form as required by International Inner Wheel. Guidelines and forms may be obtained by contacting the National Representative. Additional supporting evidence may be attached to the application, to be no more than 1 page of A4. A photograph of the recipient – if feasible – should be attached to the application. Payment of GBP 25,- (for certificate and badge) should be made once the application is accepted/approved by IIW Headquarters.

JOINT PROJECTS WITH GERMAN CLUBS

Inner Wheel was formed in Nigeria, July 1967. We shall be celebrating our Golden Jubilee next year. We are 980 members in 3 Districts of 89 Clubs.

We have a German married to a Nigerian and has been living in Nigeria for over 40 years. Now a Past District Chairman, Karin Uwaje. Through her we cultivated a relationship with Inner Wheel Clubs and District 81 and 85 in Germany. Since 2000 to date we have had joint projects with District 81 and District 85. District 81 supported our project with a total of almost 20,000 Euro. District 85 supported our campaign for Awareness of HIV/AIDS and Prevention of Transmission from Mother to Child. We created awareness through workshops, for Hairdressers, Barbing Salons, Traditional Birth Attendants with the support of the grants received through District 85 in Germany. We searched and found about 80 orphans of people that dies of HIV/AIDS and created a project we named Succour to Orphans of People that dies of HIV/AIDS. District 85 through Barbara Von Saldern was responsible for past of the funding.

A Scholarship was created in the name of Gisela Rauhut since 2009 where 6 gifted children were selected supported through Secondary School to University. The group of six has been turned around every year. As new recipients were replacing graduating ones. A sum of over 15,000Euro has been spend on this Scholarship programme that still has two more to finished the third round of 5,000 euro. District 911 received 1,000 euro every year for the 6 children school fees.

We also had hearing aids project through Barbara Von Saldern which gave rise to the support Starkey Foundation that gave out over 2,000 free testing and moulding of hearing aids to both young and adult with hearing disability in Lagos State.

In 2008 Barbara Von Saldern a Past District

Chairman of D.85 linked us with a hospital that wanted to upgrade its Ultrasound Machine and was ready to donate the old functioning machines to any country willing to pay for its freight. We accepted to receive the one Abdominal and Virginia Ultrasound Machine and one Abdominal Ultrasound machine, which were donated to Health Centre in Oshodi/Isolo Health Centre in Lagos and a Rural hospital in Abuja. District 911 and District 913 a paid for the freight from Germany to the various point of donation. We supported with medical accessories. One Mammography machine was also dated through Barbara Von Saldern went to District 914 and was installed at the (now old) Abia State Teaching Hospital in Aba.

Inner Wheel in Nigeria has made a tremendous impact in the life of children by donation thousands of school in bag to various primary school in the rural part of the country cut across the three districts in Nigeria. Skill acquisition and empowerment for hundreds of women and few men programme is a yearly project in the various Districts in Nigeria.

Through Past District Chairman Karin Uwaje and Past District Chairman of Barbara Von Saldern Nigeria and Germany Clubs in District 81 and 85 have great memories of joint projects that benefitted a great number of poor people.

The annual event affords Inner Wheel members in Nigeria the opportunity to meet one another, interact and be educated on various issues. Most importantly it exposes members to new environments, ideas and cultures. Activities at the rallies have gone beyond the initial agenda of the Oguta rally. Districts still display the activities of their clubs (projects executed) but it is no longer as competitive as was the initial practice where trophies were given to winning Districts. The business session and recently execution of NGB projects have been incorporated into the programme of rallies

making them more interesting and educative. In 2015 at Olumo, Abeokuta, the Inner Wheel Leaders Retreat (Elders Retreat) was introduced, thereafter becoming a major event at Rallies.

Inner Wheel members in Nigeria look forward to February each year to attend the rallies because that means they will be meeting and fraternizing with their friends, visiting memorable and interesting locations of the host city, relaxing and reducing accumulated stress and listening to important lectures by renowned resource persons. Worthy of mention is the fact that the organizers of the rallies go extra miles to get interesting venues and attraction sites for the gathering. MY PERCEPTION OF INNER WHEEL TODAY

International Inner Wheel was formed by Mrs Margaret Golden 94 years ago in Manchester on 10th January 1924 with about 27 women who were wives of Rotarians by their concern for Public Welfare, giving their time and energies to help in any services undertaken by their husbands. Subsequently the 10th of January 1970 became recognized as International Inner Wheel Day Worldwide.

The birth of International Inner Wheel movement in Nigeria was welcomed 50 years ago however, this movement metamorphosed after some years to become known as Inner Wheel movement and was chartered in Nigeria with Lagos Club as the first Club. History revealed that, membership then, was limited to wives of Rotarians only. These men were influential and highly placed individuals who had excelled in their various fields of endeavours. They supported their spouses with all necessary requirements to sustain and nurture the young Club to eventually extend to almost 80 Clubs and 3 Districts operating in Nigeria today. The new policy of admission of women into Rotary in 1988 came as a setback to the steady growth of Inner Wheel as membership and extension started dwindling. This downward trend continued until the review of the Inner Wheel Constitution which opened up more avenues to extension of membership to family and friends of existing Rotary and Inner Wheel members (women only).



Activities : In some parts of the world, where governments are responsive to the Social needs of the citizenry, activities of Service Clubs like the Inner Wheel is limited to specific areas, unlike in our Country Nigeria, they extend to virtually all aspects of life---- Health, Education, Socio-economic etc, executing projects like:

- (a). Construction/equipping Hospital ward, Provision of Dialysis Machine.
- (b). Vocational Training and Economic Empowerment programs for the down trodden women especially.
- (c). Constructions of Home for the Blind and Spinal cord injuries association.
- (d). Awareness Campaign on Female Cancers with emphasis on Breast and Cervical Cancer and Prevention of Transmission of HIV /AIDS from Mother to Child.



- (e). Organising Career Counselling talks, general hygiene and Awareness on Sexually transmitted Infections for Senior high schools thereby promoting abstinence from sex.
- (f). Provision of Eye glasses and eye test for the less privileged young and elderly.
- (g). Observing Notable International Days ie International Day of Charity, International Day of Friendship, Campaign on End Violence Against Women and Girls just to mention a few. The list is endless and demand for assistance from Members are enormous.

As we pray for abundant blessings on members and the public donors who entrust funds on us to carry out specific acts of charity, we also appeal to members to rededicate themselves to the true objectives of Inner Wheel by promoting True Friendship amongst ourselves and our clubs, commitment to personal service and not leaving responsibilities for 'anybody' when it should actually be for 'everybody'.

Communication : Distance is no barrier these days with technology of meetings via Skype, Whatsapp and several other online platform.

In the hirachy of Inner Wheel in Nigeria, we have in the recent past produced many Board Members, Board Directors and International President.

Conclusion - To keep the flag flying, Charity they say begins at home. Let every member continue to be a good ambassador of the Inner Wheel Objects right from our homes, Schools, market places, communities religious organizations, villages, towns and cities, so that we can all leave in a more peaceful and friendly world.



Be the Change you wish to see in the World



After I graduated from University and began my National Service in Nigeria years ago, one of my first projects focused on Female Genital Mutilation. The organization where I worked, Communicating for Change, had decided to make a documentary

telling the story from the point of view of the Genital Mutilator – a leading lady in the community called Stella.

For Stella and her community, FGM was a generational practice they weren't quite ready to give up. A few non-governmental organisations had been working with the community, and through various initiatives they began to show Stella the deep rooted impact of all the cutting she had been doing. During one performance of a community play on FGM, Stella was so moved to see her actions mirrored to her that she decided at that point 'I no go cut again' – I will never cut, again.

Stella took her change of heart a step further; she began talking to other women in the community about how the modern world is no place for these practices and how it spoils society for the current generation and the ones to come. And because Stella is living proof of the change that she wished to see in the world, people listened, and they eradicated the practice within one generation in her own community.

This is not surprising because the truth is, we are all changemakers, whether we realize it or not. All our little actions, thoughts and words are constantly shifting our own lives and the lives of those around us. Chaos theory states that a butterfly flapping its wings in America, may lead to a tornado in China years later. That is the same way our smallest actions have immense and unpredictable power.

So many of us as women, don't fully see nor own our power. We may be aware of it at some level, but we are often distracted by the circumstances around us and preoccupied with our schedules, events, and the minutiae of daily life. Often as women, and perhaps especially African women – we're constantly facing those who are set on disenfranchising and disempowering us.

But every so often we are able to lift our gaze from our own personal quests and see the bigger picture of the world around us. And when we don't like that picture, we don't just wish for change, we make change.

Sometimes as women, we are able to do this as part of big international outcries like the Women's March or #TimesUp and #MeToo movements.

And other times, we deliberately seek out spaces where we can link arms with small groups of like-minded women in our homes, town and districts. And those arms in turn link with other arms in our country and across

continents like we are doing today with our International Inner Wheel Sisterhood.

But we all started at home. Our districts were able to look at our communities in Nigeria and see people dying from easily screened health conditions. So we stepped in and built health facilities to find and treat conditions like breast and cervical cancer, HIV, diabetes, high blood pressure, malaria, etc so that families don't prematurely lose mothers, fathers, husbands or wives and find themselves in emotional, financial and societal distress. We noticed otherwise wonderful and capable people being held back by major and minor physical challenges and we intervened so that a blind lawyer is able to practice their legal expertise, deaf and mute children receive education, and even the shortsighted get a pair of glasses so they can study and work more effectively. We Nigerian sisters decided we don't want to see poverty drain the opportunity from orphans, widows and the disenfranchised – so we formed our own social safety nets and provide food, clothing, boreholes for water, basic sanitation facilities and vocational skills training that has given them a chance to free themselves from that same safety net. We want to be sure that the next generation of women aren't just surviving either but thriving. We provide micro credit loans so that women can take their businesses to the next level. How many women have failed to pay back these loans so far? Zero – proving that when communities are given the opportunity to make changes to their income, the economic impact is significant and long lasting. And that is why we dialogue with communities on the importance of making sure girls have an education, and then sponsor that education by gathering our three districts to fund three brilliant women through their University degrees. And in a few years these graduates will be standing on a podium similar to this one talking about, how they have passed on the assistance that was given to them. I know that like many of my sisters here, I have been blessed in so many ways I cannot count them. And despite the challenges. I have faced I continue to overcome and to make changes for the better in my own life, and that of my local and global community. In this room, I am surrounded by women who don't simply wish for change in the world, but are making that change happen. Like that butterfly, every day we flap our brilliant wings and unleash powerful forces into the world. We may not be able to control the outcomes but we can absolutely decide in our hearts what we wish those changes to be, and what actions we can take to achieve them. That power is truly our own. Now turn to the sister next to you and say 'Your brilliant wings have great power' So sisters, as you head back into the world, keep that complete truth sacred within you. Think of it every time you see anything you wish was different. Turn to it as a talisman in times of challenge and triumph. Repeat it when that Inner Wheel Club meeting is not quite going the way you hoped, because knowing that truth will be the thing that makes the difference:

“I am the change I wish to see in this world”. Then flap your brilliant, powerful wings and fly.




